There's a lot more to chickens than being simple egg suppliers.

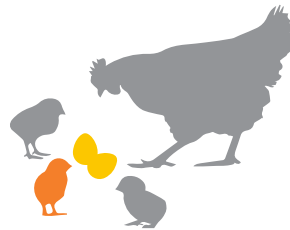

Chickens love to play, run, skip and flap their wings. They also enjoy sunbathing.



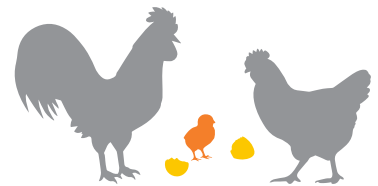

and call for a battery cage ban.

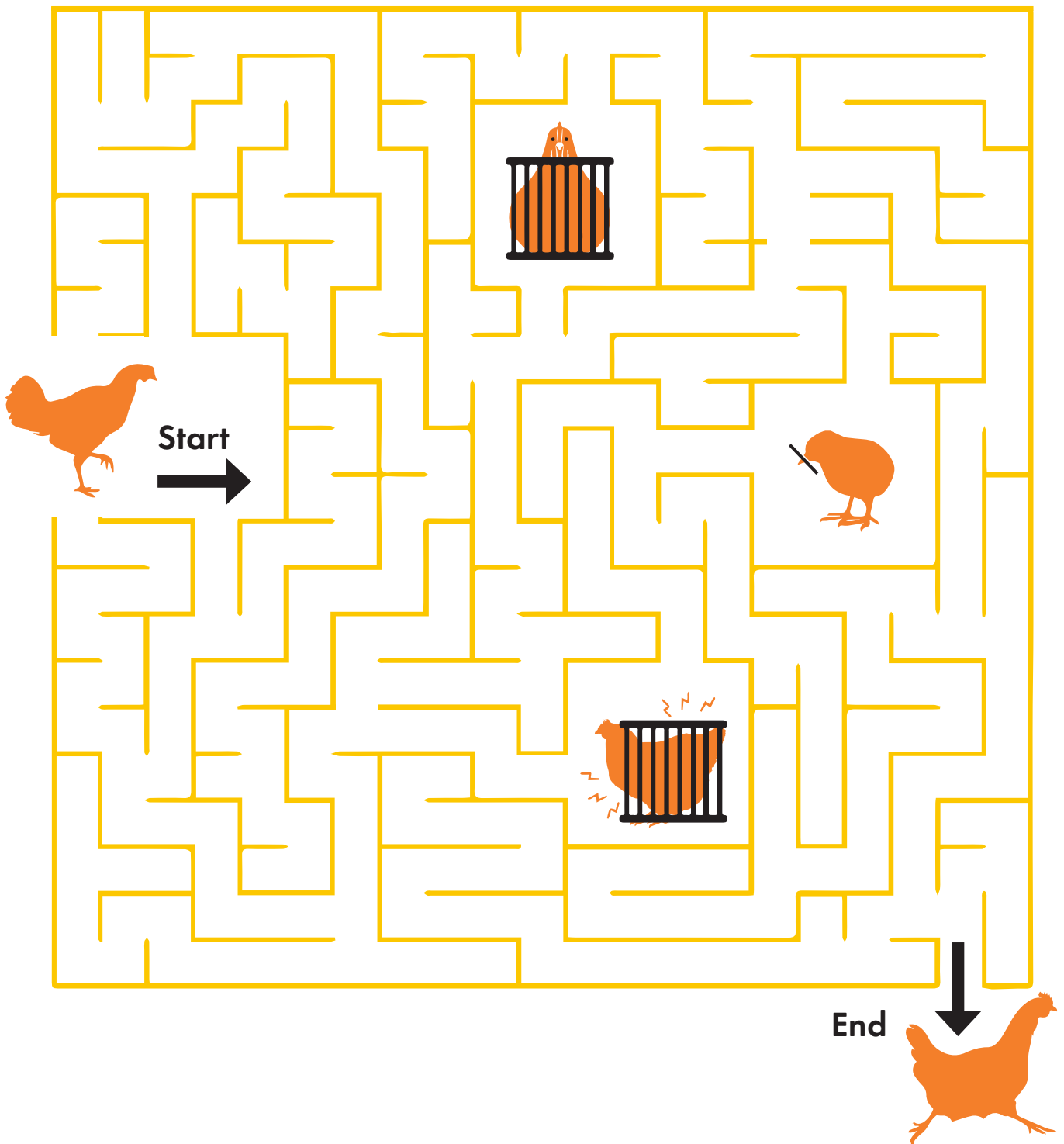

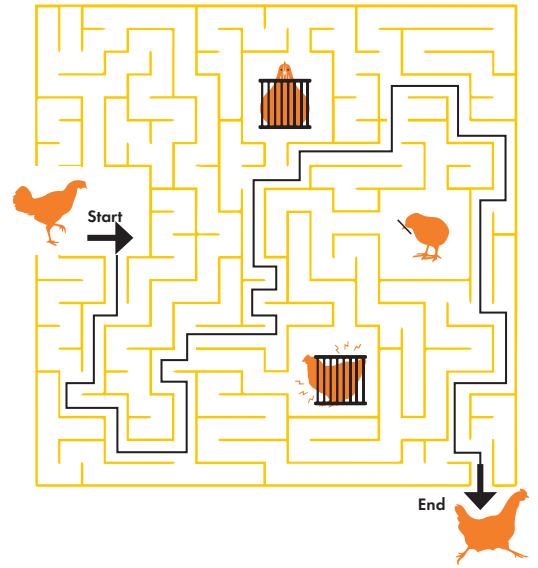

Permanent confinement

Hens suffer in cruel battery cages. These playful birds are unable to flap their wings, forage for food, or dust bathe. No animal deserves to suffer like this.

Each hen has between 3 and 20 cage mates and can be given space less than an A4 sized piece of paper.

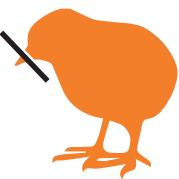

Chronic pain

Hens may also experience pain from the wounds and foot problems, as a result of standing on often sloping wire floors that are designed to facilitate egg collection.

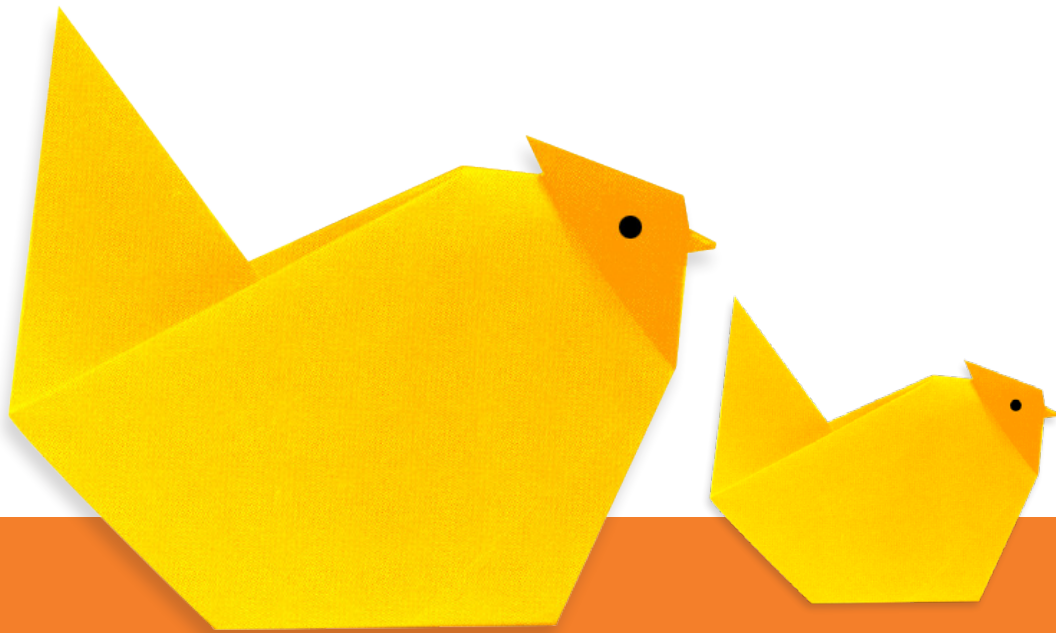

Beak trimming

Because hens in battery cages are unable choose a suitable nesting place to lay their eggs, they can become frustrated, fearful and aggressive. This may trigger behaviours such as hen pecking, bullying and cannibalism.

Rather than give hens more space, factory farmers routinely 'debeak' baby chicks with a hot blade to ensure they don't peck the other birds in their cage.

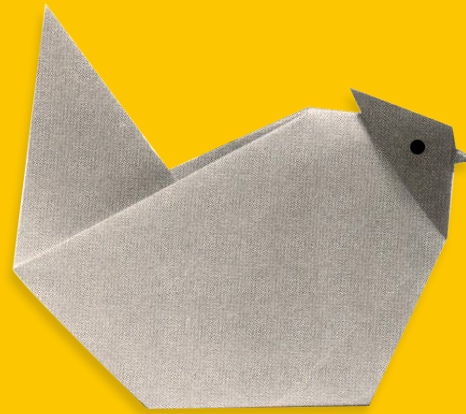
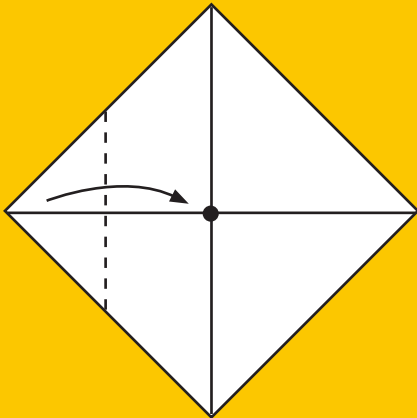

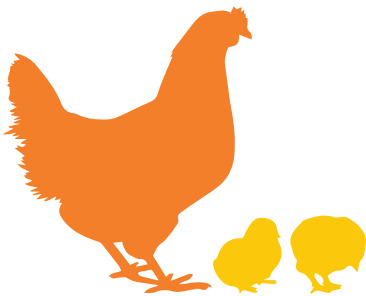
Colour for chickens
